## New Home for the Summer

The programs for the Summer Intersession will be held at a new location for us! We are meeting on South Campus at the McGauvran Center, 71 Wilder Street, Lowell. Parking is right across the street in the Wilder Lot. From Aiken Street take a right onto Father Morissette Boulevard which becomes Pawtucket Street. Stay straight for about ½ mile. Wilder Street is the third left after the School Street bridge. The McGauvran Center is on the right. See maps at <https://www.uml.edu/maps>.

An added benefit – we can get coffee and more! Here is the description of the building from the website:  
*McGauvran is an all-you-care-to-eat dining hall with “home-cooked” entrees at Full Plate, pizza and pasta at Aroma, sandwiches from Broadway Deli, a salad bar at Wilder Farms, gluten-free options at Choices and late-night takeout from Grill Out. There is seating for 400 on the first floor, including a bright and open section with a two-story glass wall providing a view of the South Campus quad. In addition to a bakery and café, the second level features retail food options at Subway and Freshii, a Canadian chain specializing in wraps, burritos, salads and smoothies. Grab-and-go options are also available at the Merrimack Market. There are seminar rooms on the third floor for group work.*

## Mysterious Mars – In 3D

On February 21<sup>st</sup>, approximately 60 LIRA members and guests gathered in Room 106 in University Suites, buckled up our seat belts and took off for Mars!

Kelly Beatty, until recently the Senior Editor of *Sky and Telescope* magazine, was just the right tour guide for our trip. With a Bachelor's degree in geology and a Master's degree in science journalism, Kelly has specialized in planetary science and space exploration. He conceived and edited *The New Solar System*, considered a standard reference among planetary scientists, and he has been writing about planetary science since he joined the staff of Sky Publishing in 1974. He has twice been honored by the Division for Planetary Sciences of the American Astronomical Society for meritorious service and scientific journalism.

In a lively and humorous presentation accompanied by numerous colorful slides, Kelly pointed out that Mars, the Red Planet, is more like Earth than any other planet in our solar system. Thanks to several spacecraft that have circled Mars, and "landers and rovers" that have crawled its surface, we have learned that while it is currently a deeply frozen wasteland, Mars was once a warm planet with a dense atmosphere and rivers of liquid water flowing across its surface. With the 3D glasses we wore for part of the presentation, we were able to see clearly the grooves left by streams and rivers of water and the striations in the mountains and land surfaces that formed over thousands of years.

Kelly explained to us the differences in the revolutions of Earth and Mars around the sun and pointed out that on July 31<sup>st</sup> this year, Mars will be the closest to earth that it has been since 2003, and will be easily visible in the night sky. That left us with something to look forward to!

Kelly may be making a return appearance to LIRA in the not too distant future with a trip to Pluto for us to experience.

## ArtWalk in Downtown Lowell

On Wednesday morning, April 11th our “ArtWalk of Downtown Lowell” was a success; the weather cooperated and we did not have a Nor’easter! Our group of 11 started at the New England Quilt Museum on Shattuck Street to view an exhibit of Japanese quilts, “The 13th Quilt Nihon Exhibition from Tokyo.” Unfortunately, our docent had to cancel at the last minute because of a family medical emergency, but Jo Meyers, the coordinator of Visitor Services and Membership gave us a brief introduction and set us off on our own. The quilts were breathtaking. In addition to the main gallery space on the second floor, there were several side rooms - their walls covered in magnificent quilts. Some were very colorful, others displayed multi-textures and there were a few with muted tones but eye-pleasing designs. We spent about 90 minutes enjoying the Japanese quilts, and admiring their makers’ skill, creativity and patience. Many of us took time to view the museum’s permanent exhibit before meeting downstairs at the museum gift shop (a great place, btw, to find unique gifts). We then headed over to the HQ of ALL, the Arts League of Lowell, just across Dutton Street at the Gates Block Building at 307 Market Street.

The ALL Gallery exhibit was “HONORING GAIA: MOTHER EARTH.” There was an interesting mix of 2D and 3D media “respecting the changing earth and its related mythology.” The Gates Block Building is also home to an arts supply store, Van Gogh’s Gear, owned by Steve Syverson, and over 30 artist studios. Steve arranged for several studios to open during our visit so we were able to stop in and chat with a number of artists.

Our final stop was UnchARTed Gallery, an arts and music venue as well as a unique restaurant at 103 Market Street. We pulled some tables together and enjoyed delicious sandwiches, pizza, craft beer and more beneath the very colorful work of former graffiti artist/musician Donald Defrock Maker. Owner Michael Dailey stopped by our table(s) and told our group about UnchARTed’s mission – a multimedia art space that “serves as an exhibition and performance space for local artists, guest curators, ambitious musicians and creative minds alike.”

Some of us had energy to stop at the Brush Gallery, on our way back to the parking lot to take in their fun exhibit, “Visual Voices,” artwork by students in the Lowell Public Elementary Schools.

## The Story of the Bible, Part Two

Martin Luther was married to Katharina von Bora, an exceptional woman who managed the Luther household that was an early “B&B” – Luther was often entertaining guests, and they also had six children.

### **May 30: What Makes Life Significant? Professor John Kaag**

The USS Constitution, the oldest active duty ship in the United States Navy and one of the original six frigates, is berthed in Charleston Navy Yard alongside the USS Constitution Museum. The bus(es) will depart Hannaford in Chelmsford at 8:30 AM. Upon arrival we will break into two groups. For the first hour starting at 10:00 one group will receive a guided tour the museum while the other group does a self-guided tour of the ship. At 11:00 we will swap. Lunch is up to you. You can bring a box lunch\*, buy a sandwich there or find an excellent local restaurant for a sit down meal. Around 2:00 PM we will board the bus for the return to Chelmsford.

**July 11: Being Transgender - Kelly Jenkins**

In 2014 the government ordered the Justice Dept. to take the position that "sex" encompasses gender identity, thus extending protections to transgender people. In the fall of 2017 a two-page memo was sent to all U.S. attorneys and other top officials revoking this directive. Kelly Jenkins is a Wellesley Middle School teaching assistant, a fierce advocate for youth, a host and producer of "Kelly's Quest" on Acton TV, and has been featured on NPR. She will share her personal stories to help us toward a broader understanding of the word "transgender" and the many issues surrounding it.
