People with disabilities (mental retardation, chronic mental illness, physical handicaps, autistic disorders, etc.) are among the most under-represented and under-served populations in the United States today. This minor offers students a unique opportunity to develop a richer understanding of what it means to live with a disability in the context of contemporary American society. The minor is anchored by a foundation in Psychology and Sociology, along with a number of electives that allow students to see the links between disabilities and other diverse and marginalized groups (e.g., women, minorities) and to incorporate multiple perspectives (historical, political, economic, ethical). To complete the minor, all students will be required to take 4 core courses in Disability Studies, and to complete 2 to 4 three-credit electives from an approved list. Approved electives **MUST** be clearly relevant to issues connected with disability or **MUST** contain some content explicitly related to disability.

Requirements

The Disabilities Studies minor is open to all undergraduates and consists of an interdisciplinary program of 18-24 credits of required and elective courses.
