### Courses from Other Departments:

Certain Health Services, RESD, Education, Criminal Justice, Management and Work Environment courses may be approved for transfer of credits toward your degree in Community Social Psychology. Please submit a Graduate Petition to Dr. Khanh Dinh if you have any questions concerning a course.

**Autism Courses:** The Psychology Department offers a series of on-line courses in Behavioral Intervention in Autism (BIA). ## Fall 2009 Classes & Synopsis

### 47.500.201 Introduction to Community Social Psychology

Melissa Nemon

Monday

6:00-8:40pm

Introduces history and contemporary trends of community and social psychology with focus on how social and environmental forces affect individual and group quality of life. This course surveys the history, theoretical frameworks, core values, methods, approaches, and orienting concepts in the field. Required for degree.

### 47.502.201 Seminar in CSP - Strong at the Broken Places: The Art of Healing

This graduate seminar will combine theory, creative expression and cultural activism to explore the power of the arts to foster multi-layered personal and political transformation, resilience and well being. Interdisciplinary scholarship -- community psychology, feminist studies, and cultural studies -- will inform our work. We will explore complexities and intersectionalities of identities as well as relationships between identities and systems of social inequality. Creative expression and community-based work will be central to the course.

### 47.512.201 Applied Research Methods

Considers strengths and limitations of various approaches to community and social psychological research. Develops skills for formulating research questions and translating them into practical study designs. Sensitivity to research ethics as well as research practicality and validity are emphasized. Pre- or Co-requisite: 47.500. Required for degree.

### 47.526.201 Workplace Diversity

Dr. Michelle Haynes

Thursday

3:00-5:40pm

This course will explore the challenges presented by the increasingly diverse workforce within the United States. Students will consider how work groups and organizations can effectively incorporate a diversity of perspectives. Students will consider issues of oppression, discrimination and bias, with particular

attention paid to the situation here in the Merrimack Valley. There will also be some focus on personal awareness and the development of skills for addressing diversity concerns.

### 47.546.201 Grant Writing

2:00-4:40pm

This course will be a hands-on course in grant writing. One of the first lessons that you will learn is that grant writing is only to a small degree about writing. Successful grants emerge from working effectively with others to draw out ideas, capture those ideas to create a program or a plan for research, show how the plan is what is needed to respond to the "Request for Proposals", and package those ideas so that they make sense to the people who will review the proposal. Grant writing is increasingly a team building activity. Whether or not you obtain the funding is sometimes less important than the networking and planning that you do as a part of developing a grant proposal.

### 47.625.201 Advanced Community Dynamics

An examination of principles that influence community structure, function, and evolution over time. Students will learn how community patterns and activities can best be understood and how community problems and concerns can best be addressed, employing psychological and other conceptual frameworks and perspectives. Specific emphasis will be placed on the historic and diverse city of Lowell. Prerequisites: 47.500 and 47.512. Required for degree.

### 47.631.201 Practicum I

Provides supervised field experience in a setting appropriate to the student's area of specialization, plus on-campus class meetings. An average of approximately ten hours of fieldwork in an approved setting for two consecutive semesters is required for degree. Prerequisites: 47.500 and 47.512. Pre- or Co-requisite: 47.625. Required for degree.

### 47.691.2XX Directed Study: Psychology

A student-designed program of independent study under the supervision of a faculty member. Permission of faculty supervisor must be obtained in advance. To register, look up 47(Subject), 691(Catalog Number), and Graduate (Course Career), and then scroll to find the entry for your specific faculty advisor.

### 47.733.7XX Master's Project – 3 credits

For graduate students actively engaged in developing a change-oriented intervention leading to the submission of a written project report. Permission of faculty supervisor must be obtained in advance. To register, look up 47(Subject), 733 (Catalog Number), and Graduate (Course Career), and then scroll to find the entry for your specific faculty advisor.

### 47.743.7XX Master's Thesis – 6 credits

For graduate students actively engaged in research leading toward the submission of a written thesis. This course may be repeated for credit, but only a total of 6 credits may be counted toward the Master's degree. Permission of faculty supervisor must be obtained in advance. To register, look up 47(Subject), 743 (Catalog Number), and Graduate (Course Career), and then scroll to find the entry for your specific faculty advisor.

**Students are permitted to count toward their degree no more than 9 credits from any combination of 47.691, 47.733, and 47.743.**

**NOTE:** Master's degree candidates who entered in Fall 2006 or after are limited to counting no more than one on-line course toward the degree
