### Courses from Other Departments:

## Fall 2011 Course Offerings

### **47.500.201 Introduction to Community Social Psychology**

Dr. Bill Berkowitz

Tuesday 6:30-9:10pm

Introduces history and contemporary trends of community and social psychology with focus on how social and environmental forces affect individual and group quality of life. This course surveys the history, theoretical frameworks, core values, methods, approaches, and orienting concepts in the field. Required for degree.

### **47.501.201 Applied Developmental Psychology**

Dr. Andrew Hostetler

Wednesday 3:30-6:10pm

This course provides a life span developmental perspective on individual and social adaptation and change. Examines appropriate theory and research, and illustrates the influences of environmental, social and cultural factors.

### **47.502.201 Seminar: Impact of Deportations on Immigrant Communities**

Dr. Jana Sladkova

Thursday 3:30-6:10pm

This seminar will focus on the impact of deportations on immigrant families and communities in the United States in general and in Lowell in particular. We will overview immigration laws that enable deportations of undocumented immigrants, legal permanent residents, and refugees to their countries of origin. We will study how deportations affect immigrants and their children and how immigrant communities interact with the constant possibility of deportation. The seminar will incorporate weekly readings focusing on relevant research and policy as well as documentaries, media coverage, presentations, and guest speakers.

### **47.512.201 Applied Research Methods**

Dr. Nellie Tran

Thursday 6:30-9:10pm

Considers strengths and limitations of various approaches to community and social psychological research. Develops skills for formulating research questions and translating them into practical study designs. Sensitivity to research ethics as well as

research practicality and validity are emphasized. Pre- or Co-requisite: 47.500. Required for degree.

### **47.546.201 Grant Writing**

Dr. Sarah Kuhn

Monday 6:30-9:10pm

This course will be a hands-on course in grant writing. One of the first lessons that you will learn is that grant writing is only to a small degree about writing. Successful grants emerge from working effectively with others to draw out ideas, capture those ideas to create a program or a plan for research, show how the plan is what is needed to respond to the "Request for Proposals", and package those ideas so that they make sense to the people who will review the proposal. Grant writing is increasingly a team building activity. Whether or not you obtain the funding is sometimes less important than the networking and planning that you do as a part of developing a grant proposal.

### **47.631.201 Practicum I**

Dr. Anne Mulvey

Wednesday 6:30-9:10pm

Provides supervised field experience in a setting appropriate to the student's area of specialization, plus on-campus class meetings. An average of approximately ten hours of fieldwork in an approved setting for two consecutive semesters is required for degree. Prerequisites: 47.500 and 47.512. Pre- or Co-requisite: 47.625. Required for degree.

### **47.691.2XX Directed Study: Psychology**

A student-designed program of independent study under the supervision of a faculty member. Permission of faculty supervisor must be obtained in advance. To register, look up 47(Subject), 691(Catalog Number), and Graduate (Course Career), and then scroll to find the entry for your specific faculty advisor.

### **47.733.7XX Master's Project – 3 credits**

For graduate students actively engaged in developing a change-oriented intervention leading to the submission of a written project report. Permission of faculty supervisor must be obtained in advance. To register, look up 47(Subject), 733 (Catalog Number), and Graduate (Course Career), and then scroll to find the entry for your specific faculty advisor.

### **47.743.7XX Master's Thesis – 6 credits**

For graduate students actively engaged in research leading toward the submission of a written thesis. This course may be repeated for credit, but only a total of 6 credits may be counted toward the Master's degree. Permission of faculty supervisor must be obtained in advance. To register, look up 47(Subject), 743 (Catalog Number), and Graduate (Course Career), and then scroll to find the entry for your specific faculty advisor.

**Students are permitted to count toward their degree no more than 9 credits from any combination of 47.691, 47.733, and 47.743.**

Several Certificate Programs are offered in conjunction with the Graduate Program (and/or with other UML graduate programs), and are geared toward individuals seeking additional qualifications in one of the areas specified below.

Each Certificate Program consists of four graduate-level courses (12 credits). The four courses must be completed within a five year period with a minimum 3.0 grade point average, and with no more than 6 credits below a "B."
