From the President

Convocation is scheduled for **Wednesday Sept 7 at 10:00 - noon** in Coburn Hall room 255 and on Zoom. One additional item of business for the meeting will be to elect a LIRA Vice President for the current year.

The Convocation Speaker is UML's new Chancellor, Julie Chen.

Julie Chen was unanimously appointed by the UMass trustees in May 2022 and assumed her role as UMass Lowell's fourth chancellor — and just the second woman to lead the university of more than 18,000 students — on July 1, 2022. Julie Chen previously served as vice chancellor for research and economic development, a role that included managing industry partnerships, technology transfer, startups and innovation, core research facilities and economic development programs and where she very successfully grew the university's research franchise into a nearly \$95 million annual operation.

The Curriculum committee has assembled an excellent program for the coming semester. I am excited about the many new programs and presenters—including some by new members we haven't heard previously. Bruce Magnuson, Co-Chair of the Curriculum Committee, will present the course schedule for the coming semester.

2022 LIRA Scholarships

The LIRA Executive Board has agreed to award five \$1500 scholarships to five UML junior or senior students for the 2022/23 school year. Students should be full-time through May 2023 and have a GPA of 3.0 or above and take part in community service activities.

Generous contributions from LIRA members have made these awards possible and we will solicit contributions when the fall semester gets underway. The Scholarship Fund receives \$20 from individual members and \$30 from couples' membership fees, money from the holiday raffle, a portion from refreshments and other gifts during the year. The university will deposit each \$1500 scholarship directly into the students' accounts, and recipients will be introduced and recognized at the Holiday Party. If you know any candidates who meet these qualifications, they can apply for a scholarship as long as they are students at UMass Lowell.

Membership Renewal 2022 - 2023

Parking Hangtags

<u>Please read the following carefully.</u> LIRA parking permits for 2022-2023 will be <u>valid for 10</u> <u>months</u>, September 2022 through June 2023. LIRA will not have any on-campus programs in July and August 2023.

Please fill out the parking permit form below along with a \$80 check made out to UMass Lowell and **bring it to the Convocation on September 7**. LIRA can only issue parking hangtags to members that have paid their dues and have completed the vehicle information form. No one, other than those with a handicap permit, will receive a University issued parking permit without a payment of \$80.

You have 3 options if you cannot make it for the Convocation:

- If you fill out this form **with a check made out to UMass Lowell for \$80** and mail it to: Peter Sebelius, 20 Draycoach Dr., Chelmsford, MA 01824 **BEFORE** September 7, he will assign a hangtag to you. Include a stamped, self-addressed **legal-sized** envelope and he will mail it to you.
- You may have a friend bring a filled out form and check to the Convocation and get a hangtag for you.
- You can go to the Parking Access office at Campus Security office located at 220
 Pawtucket St, Lowell, MA 01854, entrance on Salem St. This is the same place that
 you get your photo ID.

IF YOU HAVE HANDICAPPED PARKING, PLEASE WRITE YOUR PLATE NUMBER AND DATE OF EXPIRATION ON THE FORM. Your parking will be free, but you will not be able to get your hangtag unless you have **ALL** this information.

Wednesday, Sept. 14: 10 a.m. – noon (Zoom Only)



Noted lighthouse historian Jeremy D'Entremont tells the history of New England's historic and picturesque lighthouses primarily focusing on the colorful and dramatic stories of lighthouse keepers and their families. Jeremy's talk will include the duties of a keeper, family life at lighthouses, woman keepers, lens technology, and more.

Articles of Confederation: Stronger than a 'Rope of Sand'

The consensus among scholars is that the Articles of Confederation was America's first constitution. Adopted in York, PA in 1777-78, it served as the new nation's framework of government until succeeded by the U.S. Constitution in 1789. Many believed it was flawed and weak, comparing it to a "rope of sand." But its adoption by the Continental Congress in York brought France on board as an ally against the British in the American Revolution. And it was strong enough to serve as America's wartime constitution, the law of the land, for more than a decade. Our session will cover how the Articles of Confederation were drafted and adopted, particularly the hard work done by Continental Congress in the frontier town of York in crafting America's first constitution.

We will tour the new Lowell Justice Center, which was completed in 2020 just before the pandemic. The tour will include the Law Library, Juvenile, District and Superior Courts; some of the holding cells, as well as the Registry of Deeds. We will hear from the Senior Court Officer in charge, and one of the judges, as well as Richard Howe, Registrar of Deeds for North Middlesex County. If appropriate, we will be able to sit in on a portion of a trial. The cases being heard will be determined closer to the tour date.

The views over Lowell are magnificent from the glass-sided windows on each floor of the six-story building. Do not bring anything that would be considered illegal. Everyone will go through the metal detectors at the door, and we will then wait inside on the first floor. No photos or videos are allowed, and bags will be searched. The Justice Center is at 370 Jackson Street. Metered on-street parking is available, or you may park in the Hamilton Garage off Dutton opposite Broadway Street or the Early Garage, 135 Middlesex. Friday, September 30 Jonathan Lemire at UMass Lowell

Jonathan Lemire is White House Bureau Chief for Politico. He is also the host of "Way Too Early" on MSNBC and a political analyst for MSNBC and NBC News. His first book, "THE BIG LIE: Election Chaos, Political Opportunism, and the State of American Politics after 2020," came out in July 2022 and was an instant New York Times bestseller.

Prior to joining Politico, Jonathan was a White House reporter for The Associated Press where he covered two presidential administrations, first Donald Trump and now Joe Biden. He broke scores of news stories and wrote authoritative analysis pieces while covering the day-to-day workings of both presidencies, as well as the 2020 campaign, the nation's response to the COVID-19 pandemic and the insurrection of January 6th, 2021. He interviewed President Trump in the Oval Office, traveled with the presidents to the Middle East, Asia and Europe and received attention for his news conference questions to Trump and Russia's Vladimir Putin at their July 2018 Helsinki summit.

In addition to his hosting duties, Lemire is a regular on "Morning Joe" as well as a frequent guest on MSNBC programs like "Deadline White House with Nicolle Wallace" and "Katy Tur Reports," and he contributed to the network's coverage of the 2020 election and Biden's inauguration. Previously he covered New York City and State politics, including the 2013 mayoral election. Before joining the AP in 2013, he spent more than a decade at the New York Daily News, covering the 2012 presidential election, City Hall and the September 11th terrorist attacks. He grew up in Massachusetts, graduated from Columbia University and lives with his wife, journalist Carrie Melago, and their two sons, all while caring entirely too much about the Boston Red Sox.

Jonathan will discuss his book, the upcoming mid-term elections and politics in Washington in general.

This will take you to the main parking area. There is additional parking for ten vehicles at the Harvard Road parking area.



The area is situated along a geologic boundary between the Nashoba and Merrimack Terrane in what is known as the Tadmuck Brook Schist. Prof. Lori Weeden from UMass Lowell's Environmental, Earth and Atmospheric Sciences department will talk about the geology of the area as we enjoy the scenic views.



Trail level: Easy to moderate. We will be taking the yellow trail for most of the tour, which starts with a relatively steep climb. (see the map on the next page) The remainder of the hike will be on a gentler incline. It is recommended that sturdy hiking boots or athletic shoes are warn. Depending on recent weather, the trail can be muddy.
