

## Visit to the New England Aquarium

On November 6, LIRA members had a fun visit to the New England Aquarium in Boston. As you enter the doors, the first exhibit you see is the large penguin exhibit with over 80 African, rockhopper and little blue penguins. At one point during the visit, two African penguins were making such a loud noise that it could be heard all over the aquarium. Walking around the giant 200,000 gallon salt water tank, starting at the 4<sup>th</sup> floor and working our way down, we saw many varieties of fish, but the most well-known resident is Myrtle. The green sea turtle joined the aquarium in 1970, one year after it opened on June 20, 1969. The turtle is 90 years old and weighs more than 500 pounds.

As you walk down the spiral around the big tank, there are many exhibits on each of the four floors. It was exciting to see the giant Pacific octopus, Ruddy, attached to the glass. Usually they are hiding in some small hole in the exhibit. These creatures are very intelligent and can change colors in an instant. One of the most unusual fish doesn't look like a fish at all. The leafy seadragon looks like seaweed and are found along the southern coast of Australia. The sea nettles glide in the water opening and closing the large golden brown bell which can be about 15 inches in diameter and their tentacles can be 15 feet long. The extensive variety of marine life was enjoyed by all.




L to R: Penguins, Octopus Ruddy, top: turtle Myrtle, middle: leafy seadragon, bottom: sea nettle

## Albert Einstein – Relatively Speaking

The year is 1948, and Professor Einstein has made Princeton his home since 1933 when he came here as a refugee from Germany. One of the reasons he chose Princeton was to continue his research at the Institute for Advanced Study. For the past 15 years, he has rarely left his new home, preferring to divide his time between the Institute and his domestic life. For the next hour we imagined that we were gathered in Einstein's living room in his home in Princeton, New Jersey. He is accustomed to entertaining visitors who are interested in knowing more about his life and his discoveries in physics. Professor Einstein (as portrayed by actor George Capaccio) delivered an entertaining and informative performance for LIRA members during the Fall session. He talked about his childhood and early life, his joys and his sorrows, his friends and family and of course about his momentous life's work.

## Canterbury Shaker Village

Against the backdrop of gorgeous fall foliage, LIRA members travelled to Canterbury NH for a guided tour of the Canterbury Shaker Village. Our tour guides started with a short history of the Shakers and how they came to settle in Canterbury in 1792. We toured the Meeting House, the Laundry, and the Dwelling House, where we learned how each structure fit into the daily lives of the Shakers. Though it is no longer an active community, the museum at Canterbury interprets 200 years of Shaker life through its exhibits, buildings, gardens, programs, and tours. The museum has an enviable collection of Shaker objects, manuscripts, and photographs along with surviving architecture from all periods of its history. LIRA members had the opportunity to investigate many of them on their own before our return home.

## Climate Change

During the four sessions of 'The Science Behind Global Climate Change' LIRA participants learned from Professor Emeritus Bob Gamache that changes in global weather patterns since the start of the Industrial Revolution have grown at a much faster rate than ever before. The data shows that the burning of fossil fuels is responsible for a steady increase in temperatures worldwide resulting in extreme weather events including flooding, droughts, hurricanes, and melting of the polar icecaps leading to a rise in sea levels.

Course participants role-played as United Nations ambassadors and discussed the impact of various measures, such as reforestation and cutting the use of fossil fuels and contributing to a climate change fund, with guest presenter Carolyn McCarthy of UML's Climate Change Initiative.

Other guest speakers included Prof. David Kingsley of UML's Department of Economics, who presented information about the impact of climate change on global economies. Prof. Emeritus John Wooding, Political Science, discussed how political leaders of developed and developing countries must come to some agreement about how to best control an out of control situation. Participants also brainstormed solutions to reduce the threat of climate change as members of designated countries and were able to see how those solutions would actually impact the current situation.

Participants learned that each of us can make changes to reduce our own carbon-footprint by recycling, switching to non-fossil fuels as sources of energy, etc. By raising awareness and by voting for strong climate-change believers we stand a chance of turning the tide so that this planet will remain habitable for future generations.

## Election 2020

LIRA members have a great interest in politics. Many of us probably qualify as "political junkies!" With the campaign for the Democratic nominee for President attracting over 20 potential candidates, and debates beginning in late summer, LIRA decided that a course on what to expect in the 2020 Election was in order. Assistant Professor John Cluverius from UMass Lowell's Political Science department was the instructor. The course description reminded attendees that we will be electing not only a President, but the entire House of Representatives, and one-third of the members of the Senate. The class was well-attended, and we learned interesting and

sometimes surprising facts about money in politics, the Electoral College, the nomination process, voting/voter suppression and polling, public opinion and polling techniques.

Professor Cluverius is a member of the Political Science faculty and is also the Associate Director of UML's Center for Public Opinion. He shared with us many insights into the science of polling. We will look forward to a course for Fall 2020 – in the heat of the campaign – for more insights into the election process.

## Tour of Western Avenue Studios

On September 25, about 20 LIRA Members went on a tour of the Western Avenue Studios in Lowell. The tour was organized by LIRA Member Lisa Hertel and led by artist Maxine Farkas. We saw paintings of all types, photographs including 19<sup>th</sup> century photos made with glass plates, sculptures made from clay and those just put together from trash. We saw weaving and works of art made with glass. We also learned a little about the artists themselves and their lives at the studios.

## Great Decisions

**Great Decisions** is America's largest discussion program on world affairs. The Foreign Policy Association of America provides background information for eight of the most critical issues facing America each year. The LIRA Great Decisions group meets on Thursday mornings and devotes two two-hour classes to explore each topic in depth. In the fall 2019 semester we discussed:

*Decoding U.S.-China trade* – Rich Grove led the discussion of how outmoded statistics give a misleading measure of trade and economic strength of China and the United States. China's *Made in China 2025* plan is a strategy for achieving dominance in ten of the most important economic sectors in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

*Cyber conflicts and geopolitics* – Bob Hanlon led the discussion of cyber conflicts including interference in elections and potential attacks on critical infrastructure. Key adversaries are Russia, China, Iran and North Korea. Cyber conflict will require new ways of looking at 21<sup>st</sup> century warfare.

*The United States and Mexico: partnership tested* – Neal and Margie Berenson led the discussion of the complex and intertwined history and relationship between the United States and Mexico. The war on drugs, immigration and trade issues have added strains.

*State of the State Department and diplomacy* – Steve Buccieri led the discussion of how the Trump administration has upended the usual ways of conducting diplomacy. Adversaries and dictators have been strengthened and allies ignored and discouraged. Changes in foreign policy are announced in tweets.



### **January 15: The search for the 19th century frigate La Medusa** – Charles Mazel

**NOTE: This program will meet in the O'Leary Library Mezzanine Reading Room**

In 1980 a French marine archaeological expedition sailed to the still-uncharted waters of the Arguin Bank, located the 1816 sunken wreck of La Medusa and recovered artifacts for museum display. Charles Mazel, PhD, was the expedition's Technical Director. In the "Search for the Medusa," Dr. Mazel will recount the events of the shipwreck, including its causes and aftermath; how French romantic artist Theodore Géricault came to paint his masterpiece *The Raft of the Medusa*; and the adventure and technology used in the expedition to locate the Medusa's remains. Charles Mazel holds a Master's in Ocean Engineering from MIT and earned his PhD in Marine Biology at Boston University.

## **January 29: The Lowell Mill Girls Outside the Mills** - Assistant Professor Brigget Marshall

**NOTE: This program will meet at the Campus Recreation Center**

“In this session, we’ll learn about mill girls and popular culture in Lowell in the mid-nineteenth century (primarily 1830 to 1850). We’ll focus on what the mill girls were doing when they weren’t working in the mills. Lowell’s mill girls were avid consumers of literature, including newspapers, poetry broadsides, and literary magazines, and they also wrote and published their own magazine, the Lowell Offering. They enjoyed walks (and shopping!) in the streets of Lowell, and they regularly visited the Lowell Cemetery. During the session, we’ll look at historical images and read excerpts from writing by and about Lowell’s mill girls to understand their lives.”

## **February 5: Flight of Remembrance** - Marina Dutzman Kirsch

Marina Kirsch, award-winning author of *Flight of Remembrance: A World War II Memoir of Love and Survival*, will present her family’s story from the Axis side of WWII in Latvia, occupied Poland, and Germany—a story that includes two German veterans and provides a perspective seldom heard in the U.S. Her father, a Latvian aeronautical engineer, was forced to flee his homeland in 1939 before the first Soviet takeover. The only nation offering refuge was Nazi Germany. Hear his story of being drafted into the Luftwaffe, meeting the author’s mother in 1940 Berlin, and forging a new beginning in America, including a key role in the U.S. space program.

## **February 12: 125 Years Ago: When Coburn Hall First Opened** - Assistant Professor Marie Frank

The university’s celebration of its 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary offers a timely opportunity to revisit the history of Coburn Hall from its opening in 1897 to the current restoration underway. Home to the Lowell Normal School and then Lowell Teachers College, Coburn Hall served as the only building on South Campus until the 1950s and has remained a focal point of campus activity. No expense was spared in the construction of the building and the curriculum itself was notably avant-garde for the time. This talk will focus on the early years of the school but also give special attention to the WPA murals and their conservation.

## **February 19: Interdisciplinary undergraduate student volunteers from eNable Lowell present on their experience designing and distributing 3D-printed assistive devices to children with limb-differences.**

eNable Lowell started as the local chapter of a global online community devoted to using 3D-printing technology to provide assistive devices to people with upper-limb differences. Since then, this interdisciplinary group of undergraduate students have expanded their mission beyond that of the online community to design customized, confidence-boosting, task-specific assistive devices for members of their network, all at no cost to their recipients.
