Margin of errors have been adjusted to include for design effects resulting from weighting and survey design features.

Methodology in Brief

Data collection by Abt SRBI, Inc. This is a survey of 1624 Massachusetts Registered Voters collected using an overlapping dual-frame random digit dial design with a 68% landline/32% cell phone split.

Respondents qualify as registered voters if they say they are registered to vote at their current address. Likely Democratic Primary Voters were identified as voters Registered as Democrats or “unenrolled” who indicated an intention to vote in the Democratic primary. Reported frequencies have been weighted so that the final data reflect known population totals for age, gender, race, education, and geography in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Details are available in our full methodology report.

While we report a Likely Voter Model for Democratic Primary Voters for the September 9th Primary, we explicitly do not report a likely voter model for the trial heats for the November 4, 2014 General Election as such models are unreliable more than 30 days before an election.

Likely Voter Modeling in a Semi-Closed Primary Election

A note about our likely voter model. Massachusetts uses what is often termed a “semi-closed” primary system. In such a system, an unenrolled voter makes a public declaration at their polling place of which primary ballot they choose to vote on, without actually registering for that party. About half of all Massachusetts registered voters are “unenrolled.” If registered Democrats and Republicans choose to vote in a primary, they must vote on their party’s ballot, unless they request, in writing, to change their registration 20 days before an election. We therefore, designed question tracks that differed slightly for registered Democrats and unenrolled voters in developing our Democratic Primary Likely Voter Model. Registered Republicans were excluded as our survey was fielded within 20 days of the election and hence it was too late for any registered Republicans to change their registration status in order to vote in the Democratic primary.

We included in our Democratic Primary Likely Voter model any Democratic registrant who said that they either definitely, probably, or may or may not vote in the primary election and any unenrolled registrant who said they were planning to vote in the Democratic primary. This method produced a likely voter electorate with 469 Democratic registrants and 216 unenrolled registrants.
